And now! Being Church after the Royal Commission



Francis Sullivan AO

Francis Sullivan AO was the CEO of the Catholic Church's Truth Justice and Healing Council through the course of the Royal Commission into Child Sexual Abuse. Prior to that he was the Secretary General of the AMA and CEO of Catholic Health Australia. He currently is Executive Chair of the Mater Group of hospitals in Queensland, a director of Mercy Health Australia and chairs Catholic Social services Australia.

Dr Rosie Joyce CSB

Rosie Joyce is a Brigidine Sister and canon lawyer who lectures in canon law at Yarra Theological Union, a college of the University of Divinity. Her PhD thesis, *The Understanding and Practice of the Vow of Obedience by a Selected Group of Women Religious: An Australian Study* is the first comprehensive Australian study of how women religious view and live this vow today. She has taught in primary and secondary schools across Victoria and has been the principal of four different secondary schools. Rosie has also been the Provincial Leader of the Brigidines and is a past president of *Catholic Religious Australia*, the peak body representing the female and male religious congregations in Australia.

Strength and vulnerability: a review of the Church's capacity for a mission to heal



Dr Ruth Powell

What is the current capacity of the Church to take part in God's mission to heal? What resources are available for this task? What are the challenges that must be acknowledged? Dr Ruth Powell, Director of NCLS Research, has been studying the relationship between church and wider community for nearly 30 years. Using the rich information from community surveys, Ruth will outline how Australians approach spirituality and religion, as well as their openness to churches.

She will also highlight insights across decades from National Church Life Surveys – the largest dataset on local church life in the world. With a focus on the resources found among churchgoers, leaders, and local churches, Ruth will reflect on how well-equipped the Church currently is to continue a mission to heal. Ruth Powell has worked with NCLS Research since 1991 and became Director in 2007. She also holds a position as Associate Professor and Research Fellow, Public and Contextual Theology Research Centre, Charles Sturt University, as well as Honorary Professor at Alphacrucis College.

Designed as a fully peer-reviewed journal for the consideration of every aspect of contemporary ministry, and founded by Harvest Bible College, it has been taken over by the Christian Research Association to support academic reflection on the practice of ministry.

Imagine That!



Join Scriptural storyteller Jeff Lawrence and Scripture scholar Debra Snoddy for this session at the end of the conference where you will be challenged to consider how the conference has influenced you.

Social gatherings

No conference would be complete without social gatherings – that's where new professional contacts are made and friendships cemented. Only this time, you have to bring your own drinks and nibbles! Depending on the size of the group, the gathering might be split into break-out rooms to enable easier interaction.

Dinner and picnic

We can't be all together in the one place at this conference, but participants living in the same cities might like to gather together on the Thursday evening. Such places include Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and Canberra. Gatherings could be at a restaurant or in a park, depending on weather and local COVID restrictions. Participants will be given the contact details of the local organiser in each place.





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Information for participants

It is highly probable that you are already quite familiar with using Zoom. But if you are not, here's what to do:

To join a meeting, simply click the website link related to the session you wish to join. That will open your browser and ask you to open Zoom. Do so and you will enter the meeting. The links will be sent to you after you have registered for the conference and before the conference begins.

If for some reason the link doesn't work, go to <u>https://zoom.us/</u>, click on "Join a meeting", and enter the meeting ID and then the meeting passcode that you received along with the link.

Where possible, join the meeting a few minutes in advance of the start of the session, so that you have a chance to test your connection and the meeting can begin promptly at the scheduled time.

Discussion groups during the Conference aim to facilitate open and stimulating conversations.

All content is for your viewing during and after the conference, and *must not be distributed or shared* with anyone else, and *should not be cited without express written permission* from the presenter.

During the plenary presentations

- Everyone except for the speaker will be muted.
- If we experience bandwidth issues, we may have to ask that everyone not currently asking a question turn off their video as well. However, even if your video is off, you'll still be able to see the speaker.

Questions during plenary and workshop sessions

- Send your question in a private "Chat" message to the Chair of the session.
- The "Chat" function is found on the bottom bar of your Zoom screen. Open it and you'll see a box to type messages. At the outset this is set to "Everyone." Click on "Everyone" and you'll see a drop-down list, and then choose the person chairing. Then you can send them your question directly. Keep questions as concise as possible.
- The Chair will keep track of the questions as they come in and will call on questioners when it is their turn.
- When called on, you will need to unmute your microphone (and make sure your video is on) in order to ask your question. Remember, it takes a second or two for the audio to kick in.
- The Chair will try to get to everyone, and may remind participants that others are waiting.

Recording

All sessions will be recorded for archival purposes.
